From Pastor Larry's Desk.....

The Quiet Power of Humility

The April 16, 2017, Easter Sunday edition of the *New York Times,* was brimming with articles about Christian faith and life. There was a review of a new biography on Martin Luther, *Martin Luther: Renegade*



and Prophet by Lyndal Roper. The reviewer, Andrew Pettegree, noting that the 500th anniversary of the Reformation would "bring forth a flood of new publications," wrote that Roper's biography, is, "undoubtedly one of the best and most substantial." I just might check it out!

In a column titled, "Save the Mainline," Ross Douthat, proposed that "many of this newspapers secular liberal readers should head *en masse* to church." As a conservative Roman Catholic, Mr. Douthat, was not proposing that his well-educated liberal post-Protestant readers convert to Roman Catholicism, but rather that they should find a mainline congregation, "and start attending every week." Mr. Douthat advised liberals to give mainline Protestantism another chance. "Just go to church," he concludes. "The mainline churches' doors are open. They need you; America still needs them."

I reckon the *Times* editor had fun figuring out where to place Sandra Tsing Loh's" first person essay, "Dusting Of My Religion," given Mr. Douthat's column. (Ms. Loh's essay was in the *Style* section.) Sandra Tsing Loh, a former Lutheran who identifies as a "middle aged Whole Foods Democrat" found herself in a November 2016 post-election malaise and decided, on the Sunday after the election, to go to church. She went to All Saints Episcopal Church in Pasadena, California, "long-established, famously liberal, robustly attended." The place was packed and by the time the service was over, Ms. Loh writes, "I got so jazzed that I think I signed up for building a mission in Bolivia *and* singing in the gay men's chorus."

Believe it or not, that's not all. The Easter Sunday *New York Times* also featured a thoughtful opinion piece by Molly Worthen on "The Evangelical Roots of Post-Truth," "President Carter, Am I a Christian?" a Nicholas Kristof interview with former president Jimmy Carter and last but not least, at the bottom of the page, drawing very little attention to itself, a Peter Wehner opinion piece on "The Quiet Power of Humility."

In his op-ed, Mr. Wehner recounts a conversation he had over breakfast with a social psychologist he knows. He asked him, "What constructive contribution could Christians make to public life?" Mr. Wehner's friend, an atheist who finds much to admire in religion, answered simply, "Humility."

While this is a perfectly reasonable hope, Mr. Wehner acknowledges that "humility is a neglected Christian virtue." He finds this odd, inasmuch as he believes that humility should be a defining trait of Christians. "Humility is hardly a hallmark of American Christianity, especially among those Christians prominently involved in politics," Mr. Wehner soberly observes. Affirming that Christians should be characterized by moral humility, he confesses that Christians "ought to be alert first and foremost to their own shortcomings—to the awareness of how wayward our own hearts are, how even good acts are often tainted by selfish motives, how we all struggle with brokenness in our lives. This is not an argument for self-loathing; it's an argument for self-awareness." I found Mr. Wehner's brief essay compelling, inspiring and instructive.

I'd like to close with a couple more quotes from this wise and learned man:

At the core of Christian doctrine is the belief that we have all fallen short, that our loves are disordered and our lives sometimes a mess, and therefore we are in need of grace. As a result, one of the defining qualities of a Christian's witness to the world should be gentleness, an irenic spirit and empathy. The mark of genuine humility is not self-abasement as much as self-forgetting, which in turn allows us to take an intense interest in the lives of others.

The greatest among you shall be a servant, Jesus said, and whoever humbles himself shall be exalted. For people of Christian faith, no one humbled himself more, or was exalted as much as Jesus himself. The cross made the resurrection possible; humility prepared the way for hope. Which raises this question: If humility was good enough for Jesus, why not for the rest of us?

Greetings from the church council,

Spring is the season of change and MSLC will soon experience a significant change as we move further along in the call process. The call committee completed the Ministry Site Profile at the end of April and the executive committee reviewed and approved. The call committee is scheduled to meet with the Bishop the first week in May and they hope to be interviewing candidates at the end of May or early June. Thank you to our Call Committee: Ed Benson, John Cassidy, Tom Som, Riley Buckmaster, Erica Haycox, Leslie Hatling, Sue Shardelman, Tom Burnside and Lisa Sampson.

Growth and change are also evident in the good work the committees do each month.

The building and grounds committee has been busy with upkeep on the church grounds and property. Specifically, they have made repairs to the ceiling fans and panels in the sanctuary and had the furnace in the parsonage serviced. The parsonage has been sitting vacant for some time and per the recommendation of B & G, the council voted to approve an initial inspection for pest control.

The Youth and Family committee is moving along with their search for a youth director. Their goal is to have a completed job description for the position by the May council meeting.

The personnel committee proposed updates to the Personnel and Policy Manual and council approved the changes in April.

The budget and finance committee is preparing to accept ministry budget requests this month to start preparing the 2018 budget in June. We continue to make our benevolence payment to the ELCA each month. 2016 Benevolence = \$26,033.

The council mailed a letter to the congregation on April 17th letting everyone know of the decision Life Enrichment Options (LEO) made to not move forward with the purchase of the parsonage. Fred Nystrom, the executive director for LEO, wrote a letter of explanation that is included in this newsletter (see pg. 9). A committee has been created to discuss options for the future of the parsonage. If you are interested in joining this committee please contact Jack Boller, Nancy Flanagan or Heidi Dukich. As soon as the options are explored, council will share them with the congregation and the members will vote.

If you are interested in learning about the different committees please consider attending the Committee Night on May 9th at 6 p.m. to learn more about what is happening in our church and how you may want to get involved.

Let Anyone with Ears, Listen!

What does it mean to hear?

During seminary, my New Testament Professor Harry Mumm tried to impress upon us the importance of being able to hear God's word. He shared a story about his grandson Ivan, who he and Mrs. Mumm were raising. When dinner time came around Mrs. Mumm would call out with a loud voice, "Ivan, it is dinner time!" Ivan would ignore her call.

A second time she would call out. "Ivan, come to the table - dinner is on." "Yes, grandma, I'm coming." But no Ivan. By the third or fourth time the appeal was more urgent, "Ivan, if you are going to get any dinner, you need to come to the table now."

Dr. Mumm went on to explain that Ivan had not heard his grandmother, until he appeared at the table. Luther had a similar understanding of God's word. For Luther, God's word was a dead word - until it addressed one's life in a way that demanded a response.

One of the precious gifts of serving the Office of Bishop is I frequently find myself in various houses of worship. Week in and week out, I watch people recite the liturgy, sing hymns, enter into prayer, and attend to the sermon. The words are powerful - proclaiming God's love, calling us to seek justice, encouraging us to be peacemakers, inviting us to be about forgiveness, and to become agents of reconciliation - there is even an invitation to come to the table.

The question I am pondering is, "Have we heard the word?"

Are these words just noise in the background that annoy us and otherwise interrupt our own personal desires? Like Ivan do we say yes and then carry on as if no word has been spoken? Like Ivan do we plan to eventually respond but not until we have to? Has the word in our time just become ritual? Has it become a word for Sunday only? Or does it still have the power to disturb us and inspire us.

The cornerstone of the Synod's Living Local movement is learning how to listen to God's word that we might hear it. Dwelling in the word is the discipline that teaches listening. We commit to reading the same text over a long time span always listening for what we haven't heard before. We become like little children who want to hear the same story read over and over again. In our household, it was Good Night, Moon. Kim and I knew it so well we would try on occasion to leave out a page. Believe me, we didn't get away with it.

The practice of learning to hear God's word is, in turn, applied to listening for God in the community by engaging our neighbors. This is so important because we never want to miss out on God's invitation to join in - in what God is already up to.

Grandma Mumm did not call Ivan to the table just to make his life miserable. Grandma Mumm called Ivan to the table that he might share in all that she had prepared for him. Not just the meat and potatoes, but the deep love of knowing that he was the apple of their eye.

Friends, join me in learning to hear the word of God. A word that continues to invite all of us to the table.



April 7, 2017

Dear Pastor Larry:

Sometimes, wanting something good to happen is just not enough to overcome all of the obstacles. In this case LEO wanted to repurpose the Parsonage into a safe and comfortable long-term home for 5-6 young adults with developmental disabilities. The Mt. Si congregation wanted to do a good deed by selling the Parsonage to LEO and by aligning the future of the Parsonage with the mission of the church. It seemed like between us, we had everything we needed to make this a very positive relationship and good for both parties. Unfortunately, our good intentions were not enough to overcome the obstacles raised by outside governmental entities.

As we have discussed, these obstacles included the following:

• The City of North Bend would not allow LEO to remodel the Parsonage without bringing the septic system up to code. They do not allow a septic system to be expanded in order to serve additional bedrooms included in a remodel.

King County Health Department manages all septic/sewer for the cities. Their requirement calls for a very large septic system to serve the existing bedrooms in the Parsonage. The new system has to be set back from the floodway (Swale) to the point that it completely fills the backyard. In addition, new systems' require a dedicated space of the same size as a reserve in case the initial drain filed fails. This required LEO to ask for an easement on church property to place this easement.

• The Federal Emergency Management Act (FEMA) also required any expansion of the building's original footprint to be elevated by over two feet. This is to match the flood control requirements, even if the property has never flooded. They also require a significant setback from the Swale, limiting potential use of the garage for bedrooms.

• The Department of Health and Social Services (DSHS) also had regulations that our adult family homes must comply to, including adding two more full bathrooms to the ground floor in the Parsonage, changing the window heights and expanding the kitchen and storage areas.

None of the governmental organizations have any flexibility in being able to grant exceptions to their rules for those of us trying to provide low-income housing.

Through no fault of LEO or of Mt. Si Lutheran the combination of all the requirements makes it impossible for LEO to convert the Parsonage into an adult family home.

While the outcome is sad, I do want to commend Jack Boller and Tom Som, for their strong and balanced support for this project. They clearly had the congregation's wishes in mind throughout our meetings for the past several years. So, when good intentions are not enough and yet one can still look back at the process and see the role played by honesty, integrity and emphasis on doing what is right—then I can honestly say that I feel elevated by the way we all worked together. While this chapter is done, we did give it a valiant effort and came away with new friends at Mt. Si Lutheran.
