This month I want to focus on the photo included with this article. It may be hard to see, but this is a granite baptismal font, 2+ feet across from the 12th century. The bowl is hand carved and a coil of stone was left in the middle of the font. Two eyes are carved into the end of the coil that are barely visible today after centuries of use. This font can be

found in Spain in small coastal town. I saw many fonts like this walking the Camino de Santiago except, none of the others had this coil in the middle. I was drawn to the font and was fascinated to learn from our guide that coil represented a snake meant to symbolize the earliest story of sin in the Bible. We witness humanities first decision to ignore God's command in the Garden of Eden when the snake convinces Adam and Eve that it is worth eating the fruit of the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil in order to "be like God, knowing the difference between good and evil."

So why is this image showing up in the baptismal font? Well, our core understanding of baptism includes the language of dying, as Jesus did, and rising, as Jesus did, to new life. Scripture talks about baptism as drowning our old self and rising to life in Christ. The snake in the font is a reminder that Jesus has defeated sin, death and the devil. Seeing the snake covered over by the baptismal water reminds that Jesus, by his own death and resurrection, has reconciled us to God and set us free from our sin. Water is a powerful symbol in our faith and the sacrament of baptism gifts us with God's unending promise that we are clothed with Christ and marked with the cross of Christ forever. I don't know about you, but I need that reminder daily - multiple times a day if I'm honest! I forget so easily what Jesus has done for me, for us, for this world. Dipping my fingers into the waters of that font in Spain, with the snake looking up at me, I had to smile and in my heart of hearts say, "Thank you, Jesus! Thank you for setting me free!"

I don't know that you'll see a fake snake added to our baptismal font at church - I don't want to scare anyone! However, I hope you can find your own way to remember your baptism - to remember the promises you have in Christ. Amen!

Some highlights of Mt Si Lutheran Church's Rich History (cont'd):

- September 12, 2009 Rev. G. Mark Griffith accepts the call and begins his ministry at Mount Si Lutheran Church. (first Sunday, Sept. 13, 2009)
- September 12-13, 2009 Mount Si celebrates 60th Anniversary
- October 11 2009 Rev. Jan Nesse, Assistant to the Bishop, installed Rev. G. Mark Griffith as the pastor of Mount Si Lutheran Church.
- April 18, 2010 Mount Si Community Garden completed and after a garden blessing, we began planting the first seeds. Contest held to appropriately name the garden "Garden of Giving" as the bulk of the produce harvested will go directly to the Snoqualmie Valley Food Bank.
- Family Mission Trip to Colville, WA
- SnoValley Teen Closet begins at MSLC to distribute clothing to teens in the valley as an outreach program as there was a great need for teens and families in the community.
- As part of Global Missions, MSLC has been a partner with Team Russia for years and Pr. Mark was able to meet and host Bishop Dietrich Brauer, Bishop of the ELC of European Russia and former pastor of our partner church in Gusev, Kaliningrad Russia and Pastor Lena Bondarenko, Acting Dean of the Central Deanery with Moscow. The beautiful artwork hung in the library was donated a few years ago by Salzburg Church, Gusev, Kaliningrad, our partner church in Russia.

More highlights of Mt Si Lutheran Church's Rich History (cont'd):

- February 19, 2013 Removal of steeple from former Calvary Lutheran Church in Ballard, WA and transported steeple safely to Mount Si Lutheran Church property. The steeple was stored until a platform base is built in order to erect the new steeple.
- June 4, 2013 Following the installation of the steel platform frame, the new steeple was successfully positioned on top of Mount Si Lutheran Church. After the steeple was placed on the platform, the steel platform was covered with white vinyl siding to match the church siding.
- September 29, 2013 Mount Si Lutheran Church had a steeple dedication and celebration. Special guests included the congregation from Calvary Lutheran Church which merged with Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church after Calvary Lutheran closed.
- Family Mission Trip to Lummi Nation, NW WA.
- June-Aug. 2015 Pastor Mark Griffith takes sabbatical. Pastor Larry Thomas serves as Pastor during Pr. Mark's sabbatical.
- Nov. 2015—Jan. 2016 MSLC hosts SnoValley Winter Shelter.
- April 24, 2016 Pastor Mark Griffith accepted call to St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Bellevue, WA. Pr. Mark's last Sunday with farewell reception provided.
- May 15, 2016 Pastor Larry Thomas, Interim Pastor, welcomed with blessing during worship and reception during coffee hour.
- Nov. 12, 2017 Pastor Larry Thomas completes call process as Interim Pastor and Pastor Krista (Oppie) Johnson accepts call as new pastor at MSLC.

Martin Luther writes in the Small Catechism:

What then does 'daily bread' mean? Everything included in the necessities and nourishment for our bodies, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, farm, field, livestock, money, property, an upright spouse, upright children, upright members of the household, upright and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, decency, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like. (Small Catechism, Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer)



In May, the six bishops of Region One (this includes the synods of Northwest Washington, Southwestern Washington, Alaska, Oregon, Northwest Intermountain, and Montana) were asked by the Region One hunger teams to write a joint letter requesting Congress to re-authorize the federal Farm Bill and to not cut important funding. The six bishops agreed to write this letter. After it was written and signed, the ELCA Advocacy staff in Washington, DC hand-delivered it to the House and Senate Agriculture Committees' leaderships and to the Representatives in each of the synod's respective states.

In June, there was a zoom event for all the Lutherans in the six synods to learn more about the Farm Bill and advocate for its continuation. This event was sponsored by the Region One hunger ministry teams, ELCA Advocacy, and Faith Action Network (FAN). Different speakers shared information, conversation happened, and the opportunity to write letters to legislators occurred.

As you might know, the six synods have over 560 congregations and tens of thousands of Lutherans from the states of Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington, and Wyoming. These synods and states are not homogenous. The bishops are not homogenous. The congregations within each synod are not homogenous. The members of these congregations are not homogenous. We have differences of opinion at times, we have different priorities, we vote differently, we even shake our heads at things that don't make sense to us about one another.

And yet, in our diversity, we are also joined in the unity of Christ and the promises we have received. Deep in our bones, we know that we are saved by grace through faith. We hold fast to the truth that God loves us no matter what. We know this and trust this and hold this. And, because of this, together we are called out into the world - as followers of Jesus and as civic members of society.

We join together - over and over - to bring about change and protect the vulnerable. We come together beyond political difference because of what we have been promised and what we are called to do and to be. The example I've been using in this article is the Farm Bill. When we advocate for this bi-partisan Farm Bill, we are advocating for farmers, migrants, agricultural workers, Indigenous peoples, hungry children, the inclusion of those who have been historically excluded, and more.

But, of course, we come together far beyond this Farm Bill. We come together because God calls us to love others as God loves us. We work together for a just society. As German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "Mere waiting and looking on is not Christian behavior. Christians are called to compassion and action, not in the first place by their own sufferings, but by the sufferings of their brothers and sisters, for whose sake Christ suffered." (A Testament to Freedom)

I am thankful and proud to be Lutheran because of all of you who feed and clothe, nourish and shelter, love and protect those who are the most vulnerable in this country and this world. It would take pages to list all the ways that you do this individually, in your congregations, in the synod, and in the wider church. Thank you for your advocacy and your care. There is, of course, more work to be done. And so let us together work towards the day when all may receive "daily bread."
