From Pastor Krista's Desk.....

Season of Epiphany

Welcome to the season of Epiphany! Churches around the world will spend an extra moment in prayer and worship on Saturday, January 6th to celebrate what is known as Epiphany....this is the moment in Jesus' birth story that we learn of the



star that has guided scholars "wise men" from lands far away to the child Jesus. They arrive to bring gifts to the child whose birth was announced with a unique star in the heavens. Here at Mt. Si we will celebrate Epiphany on the first Sunday in January. At this important festival we recall that Jesus, the Messiah, came not only to bring news

to the Israelite people. Jesus came to share a word of hope and promise with the entire world as illustrated in the presence of important emissaries from foreign lands.

We may not make much of this story today since most of us have grown up with the idea that Christianity is a global religion...a faith that spans cultures, languages, countries and races. Anyone can follow Jesus.

We may not realize how radical the arrival of the Wise men and their entourage really is. (Oh, yes, there were far more than three people who showed up to see Jesus...people of importance would have travelled with an entire retinue of servants, soldiers and officials) Jesus' insistence on opening up the promises of God to all people would be a first in history...a first attempt at claiming a universal faith for all people. I think it is hard to wrap our minds around. Prior to the arrival of Jesus the people of Israel understood the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob to be the God of their people, their nationality...others may convert and adopt their faith, but they were not going around trying to actively convert people to their way of life and faith. In the same way, other tribes and people groups had their own faiths and did not work to convert others to their beliefs unless you married into or were conquered by those people. Religions were regional, ethnic and personal. Even Rome did not insist that conquered peoples follow their gods...you simply had to worship the Emperor and at the same time you could keep your own personal ethnic religion.

So, when the Gospel story claims that the Good News of Jesus is for all people...not everyone knew what to do with such a radical idea. The disciples are upset by it, the religious leaders of the day are upset by it, the government is upset by it...no one is a big fan of this universal faith thing. It complicates things.

You see, we are used to dividing ourselves into neat groups...women over here, men over there. Mothers over here, doctors over there. Swedish people over here and Kenyan people over there. Straight A kids here and special needs kids there....you get the idea. We are a species that really seems to enjoy our categories and labels. Right? And we can get into a lot of trouble with these categories because it doesn't take us long

to assign worth and value to the labels, does it? It really is scary what we are able to do when all the sudden we place a label on someone. Sexual orientation, gender and race...depending on what label you get your life can be on the line because of the value society has placed on those labels. You want to talk about humanity's sinful nature? Look no further than our need to categorize people...we even do it to ourselves! There have been too many times in my life that my pant size and marital status have dictated how worthy I feel...how ridiculous! Why do we do this? Well, I don't think we can solve that problem....except....Jesus desperately invites us into a faith and belief that knocks down all those petty labels and casts a net so wide of inclusivity that the whole world is captured by it and invited to share one common label...child of God. Jesus invites us to take ownership of this label and begin to see our neighbors as owners of this label too....

What an absolutely freeing way to live! When we attempt, even a little, to see each person we meet as Child of God first...how might our attitudes towards people change? How would our valuation of people change? Here is the stickler....the label, Child of God, is not dependent on church membership, denominational affiliation, or even baptism...the label, Child of God, is a gift to every human on the face of the planet, that is the message of Epiphany.

I know, I know.....doesn't faith matter in this? Doesn't belief matter? Surely, baptism matters, right??? Look at all those extra labels we want to add on....Child of God is a label God gives and Jesus proclaims and bestows on humanity from the moment of his incarnation. Faith comes into play when we finally recognize the truth of who we already are in God's eyes, children of God. Baptism is a sacrament in which we hear God say again that we are his children and in which we receive the gift of the Holy Spirit...it is the work of the Spirit to remind us that we are a child of God. Following Jesus comes when we embrace our identity as children of God. The truth is, you are a child of God and so is your neighbor. The hope is that we claim this to be true.

Why celebrate Epiphany? It is the moment God turned our world upside down and claimed us all for his love, grace and glory. It is the moment the earth received the ultimate gift....Jesus the savior **of** the world and Jesus the savior **for** the whole world...Jesus whose love extends to the ends of the earth...Jesus whose forgiveness knows no bounds...Jesus who invites all to see themselves as beloved children of God and so find themselves worthy beyond measure in the eyes of their Creator. Thanks be to God!

As we look back over 2017, Mt. Si Lutheran has much to be thankful for. Our year began with the Call Committee embarking on their task to find a new pastor for our church. For months, they worked together to create a pastoral profile and a Ministry Site Profile. From there, they began interviewing possible candidates that they felt would be a good fit for our church. In August, council was invited to meet Pastor Krista Mendoza, followed by a "Meet and Greet" in October for the congregation. The congregation then voted to call Pastor Krista to be our new pastor. We welcomed Pastor Krista on December 1st and celebrated her first Sunday on December 3rd for Advent Sunday. We are thankful for Pastor Larry Thomas, as he shepherded us for 18 months through a time of transition.

After hosting the homeless shelter for five years, the liaison committee proposed to council that we take a break from hosting for the upcoming winter months. This was due to some security issues for both the staff and the congregation of Mt. Si Lutheran, as well as, some management issues of Snoqualmie Valley Shelter Services. This was a difficult decision for both the liaison committee and council. On August 20th, the congregation voted and agreed on the proposal. The liaison committee strongly recommended that we support the homeless shelter in other ways, such as working at the day shelter in Snoqualmie on "God's Work, Our Hands" Day in September and signing up to provide dinners.

We had strong hopes of selling the parsonage to LEO, a non-profit organization that provides low-income housing to people with disabilities. Unfortunately, obstacles with outside governmental entities did not allow for any exceptions to their rules and regulations. Therefore, after many hours of research and discussions with LEO, this possibility was not to be. However, God had other plans! The parsonage has turned out to be a perfect new home for Pastor Krista and her five pets. Thank you to the Buildings and Grounds Committee for their time and efforts in preparing the parsonage for Pastor Krista.

We can celebrate new and well-established events that took place this year. In July, we sent 10 members of our congregation to Guatemala on a mission trip. They successfully built homes for people who greatly needed shelter. Our Lenten soup suppers, Sunday School, CROP Hunger Walk, Backpack project, VBS, "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday, Harvest Carnival, Quilters, Christmas Women's Brunch were fruitful, not only for the congregation, but for our local and global community.

We said farewell to Tom and Connie Som, Bob and Ann Bartlett, and Carol and Emilie Reitz who have moved and transferred their membership. We are thankful for their service to Mt. Si Lutheran. This past year we celebrated the life of Mae McLean (June) and Sue Shardelman (Dec.), both beloved life-time members of Mt. Si Lutheran.

As we look ahead, we are excited about the Family and Youth Committee beginning their search for a youth and family director. Ed Benson, Erica Haycox, Terry Adams, and Debbie Jones will be serving on council. We are thankful for the service of outgoing council members: Heidi Dukich, Courtney Adams, Michael Hanson.

Don't forget, your council members are your servant leaders that you have entrusted with the ministries of your church. Feel free to contact them to discuss issues that you feel are pertinent to the life of your congregation.

Joining with God in 2018

The Synod's Living Local movement invites us to be alert to where we see God acting beyond the four walls of the church. It is about developing the eyes to see and the ears to hear. It helps to have a few clues of where to look and listen. Here are two that have been helpful to me recently.

Clue #1: Suffering

The scriptures encourage us to look for God wherever we see and hear people crying out because of oppression, suffering, and pain. We have all had experiences of being with people and groups who are hurting deeply. It is not always easy to be present in these situations. When we are, something power-filled often happens. We experience empathy, love, and compassion. We experience blessing. We experience God.

Recently, I was with a new friend from Peru who has spent a significant amount of time living amongst the poorest people of his country. While raised in a very wealthy family, as a teenager he felt a strong call to be with the poor. Much to the consternation of his father, he left home to spend a year with a peasant farmer's family. He fell deeply in love with this family and their neighbors. He said, "I was privileged to reach out and touch the wounds of Jesus." When he returned home, he completed his education and landed a very prestigious job in the banking industry. He excelled in this work and had all the resources to live the "good life." But he missed the people he had come to know and love.

It was a shock when he told his boss, who wanted to promote him, that instead he felt called to enter into the priesthood and become a Benedictine monk. He wanted to devote his life to living in poverty and discovering God's love among the poor. It is the one place he knows he will see, hear, and experience the presence of God.

Clue #2: New Life

There is another place that I have learned to see and hear God. I find God whenever I see new life happening - whether it is the first crocus erupting in the still-cold soil of winter, the first birdsong of an early spring morning, or being on stage in my role as Community College Trustee to shake the hand of a "first person in the family" to ever graduate from college. Each of these experiences speak of hope, promise and new life and bear the fingerprints of God.

For me, there is one experience of new life that tops all others. I know of no greater joy than to hold a baby in my arms, to stroke the child's soft hair, to hear the coos of wonder, and to smell the newness. I know I am holding a miracle: one so vulnerable, so innocent, so full of fragile life. To hold a baby is to experience the presence of God.

There is a category of people who revel in the opportunity to hold a child. They are called grandparents. Grandparents who are so touched by this encounter of new life that they are willing to pack up their belongings and move across the country just to be in the presence of their grandbaby. They take hundreds of photos, eager to show the latest, and relish being able to Facetime with their grandbaby. The child re-centers their lives and becomes the source of their greatest joy.

These two clues remind us that God is present all around us - all the time. In suffering and new life; in sorrow and in joy. Let us look and listen together for where we can join God in 2018.
