### Pastor's Note...

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ.

During the Lent Season I invite you to participate in our mid-week soup supper & worship (March 12-April 9) During our worship we will use a new Vespers service written at Holden Village by Pr. Mark & Heather Griffith and others.

The Vespers service, called "Bless this Night," includes a fresh translation of the Lord's Prayer by Pr. Mark G. Here it is, line by line with the traditional prayer in italics:

O Holy One, who calls me beloved, You are in the air we breathe *Our Father, who art in heaven*.

Your name, and all that You have made, is beautiful. *Hallowed be thy name* 

Bring forth your jubilee! Give life to your dreams in heaven and on earth Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven

Nourish and sustain our bodies. *Give us this day our daily bread* 

Release our debts as we release the debts of others. And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us Do not let us turn from you. In hardship and peril, stay with us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

This is where the Lord's prayer ends in the Gospels of Luke & Matthew. There are a few manuscripts of Matthew's Gospel were we see the added doxology (for thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory). Mark and John's Gospel do not offer a version of what we now call the Lord's Prayer. The doxology is commonly added into worship as a way to formally close the prayer.

The church has used various translations of the prayer over the centuries. In our tradition there are three versions often heard on Sunday morning. Here at Mt Si we tend to stick with a version first introduced in the 1500's that translates Matthew 6:14 as "trespasses." Luke uses "debts" and an early line in Matthew 6:12 uses "sins." You can see why we have so many options!

During Lent, on Sunday morning and during Lent Mid-week we will use Pr. Mark's translation as a way to hear a familiar prayer in a new way. I pray it is a blessing for you.



#### DAUGHTERS OF NORWAY

### MSLC Council Report

On February 23rd council met to discuss financial and ministry reports of the congregation. During our financial discussion conversation took place regarding the need for an intentional fundraiser to replenish our checking account following multiple capital projects in 2024 and opening of 2025. Details regarding our goal and opportunities to give will be shared with the congregation in March.

Council voted to approve the movement of monies in our Matinence Reserve Fund (\$3,123.69) to the checking account to help offset the expense of captial projects. Council also approved the movement of \$25,000 from a CD held with MIF to a Mutual Fund account at Umpquah Bank. These are unrestriced savings.


Council approved a request for Mt Si to host a Tiny House Build on our property again this summer. Mt Si hosted two years ago. The completed house will go to a Tiny Home commnity run by LIHI. The project will take place June 23-July 3.

Council will not meet again until May. A reminder that ministry teams are asked to submit <u>written updates</u> and requests of council each month. If council has questions about your update they will reach out to the team directly. You can email or put a hard copy of your written report in council mail boxes, which are found in the hallway between the main office and multi-purpose room. ### MSLC Finance Update

To meet our projected annual budget, our General Offering income **goal is \$16,000/mo.** In January we received <u>\$14,481</u> towards our general budget. We also received an additional \$3,100 in designed giving for specific ministries beyond our budget. Our expenses in January were a little higher with the Parsonage Bathroom repairs for a total of: \$18,278

### Bishop's Letter

### March 2025

Dr. Anna Lembke, a psychiatrist and an expert in addiction, states: "Rates of depression, anxiety, and suicide are going up in countries all over the world, and they're going up fastest in the richest nations of the world. ... We are now turning to [electronic] devices and to the Internet to meet our physical, emotional, sexual, educational, every need we have. We don't really need other people anymore. We can get those needs met from the internet. I think that's a very scary prospect because I think it means that we will become more and more isolated." ("Digital Drugs Have Us Hooked. Dr. Anna Lembke Sees a Way Out," The Daily by The New York Times podcast, 2/1/2025)

What Dr. Lembke is talking about is the dopamine hit that people receive while on their phones and other devices. More and more research is coming out that dopamine, the neurotransmitter that motivates us to do things we think will bring pleasure, is being activated by electronic media in the same way that junk food activates over-eating.

So why am I (a theologian, pastor, and bishop - but not a scientist) talking about this? Well, I think that the moving from human interaction to electronic interaction is of theological and pastoral concern. You see, at the same time that more and more research is telling us about the harm that is happening when we get "hits" of dopamine from electronic media, we are also hearing (and experiencing in our own lives and social networks) that loneliness and anxiety and stress are rising. In isolation, we might lose trust in others and in our institutions, experience a crumbling of empathy, be susceptible to disinformation, and build walls instead of bridges to another.

Now, before you say to me, "Do you know what is happening in this world?" Please hear me – I know. I know. There is a lot going on in our families, with people we care about, in the United States, and in the world as a whole. I, too, am feeling despair and disbelief. There are valid reasons for feeling anxiety and stress. And we might feel isolated and scared because of these circumstances.

But I implore you, please don't try to navigate all of the things you are experiencing alone – without anyone around you. Please don't always turn to your phone and doomscroll or neglect relationships or separate yourself. Instead, I encourage you to look for those spaces where you can physically connect with another person or people. Please find those places where you can authentically, truly be yourself – in your joy, in your sorrow, in your anxiety, and more.

I pray that one of these places is your church community. That you can pray and sing and learn and grow, that you can receive and grant forgiveness through Jesus, receive the sacraments, take action through the Spirit, give and receive care, and that you can rest when needed. I pray that you may do this all in a sacred space where you deeply connect with others – even if you don't always agree with one another. I pray that you can have meaningful relationships, conversation, and can be there for one another. I pray that you receive love just as you love others. I pray that if you are feeling lonely or despairing, there are those you can reach out to who will sit with you and bring God's promises again to you.

In these days, when it feels like there is so much, may you feel God's love and grace surrounding you in the community of others. May we trust in Jesus' promise, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."
